

What is a Title I School?

Information for Parents

A Title I school is a school that receives money from Title I – the oldest and largest federally funded education program in the US.

Title I provides money to schools with a lower-income population. Schools use these funds to help students who are academically at-risk, and to help ensure that all students meet state academic standards.



Title I Facts and Stats

More than 50% of public schools receive Title I funding.

Most Title I funds go to help students in grades K-6.

There are 50,000+ Title I schools nationwide.

Title I provides 15+ billion dollars a year to schools.

- ▶ Monitor your child's academic progress. If you have questions or concerns, talk to your child's teacher(s) and/or counselor.
